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ALLEGANY - For seven months, the First Presbyterian Church of Allegany and the Unitarian Universalist congregations have shared space under the same roof, but haven't had opportunities to socialize or learn more about each other.

That will change later this month, however, when the two groups host a joint pancake breakfast in the church.

Sadie Jay-Edwards, a member of the Universalist group, said the breakfast will be at 10 a.m. April 21, between the two groups' services.
